On June 27, a large group of community leaders, educators and supporters gathered on South Georgia Tech Parkway for the groundbreaking ceremony for the new Sumter County High School. Kimothy Hadley, principal of Americus-Sumter High School, said that building the new school "will allow our community to look back on its past achievements as we prepare for our future successes. The new high school building will provide an updated learning environment for our teachers to deliver quality instruction resulting in a high level of student engagement." Additionally, Sumter County Board of Commissioners Chairman Clay Jones stated that when new companies are looking to relocate or expand in a community, they are looking for an educated workforce. "... With this new facility coming along, we're going to have that," he said. "The economy in this community is going to rise."
